

Hudson-Sudbury Jail Diversion Program

Quarterly Report: January-March 2022

JDP Interventions

During this quarter of 2022, Hudson and Sudbury police officers referred a total of seventy-seven (**77**) cases to the embedded Jail Diversion clinician.

Arrest Diversions

The primary goal of the Hudson-Sudbury Jail Diversion Program (JDP) is to divert low-level offenders away from the criminal justice system and into more appropriate community based behavioral health treatment. During this quarter of 2022, a total of eight (**8**) individuals with mental health challenges were diverted from arrest by Hudson and Sudbury police officers. Below is the breakdown of arrest diversions per month and the percentage of diversions.

In addition to the benefit of diverting individuals in crisis from arrest, this represents estimated cost savings of **\$20,160** to the criminal justice system (\$2,520* per arrest event).

Emergency Department Diversions

An additional goal of the JDP program is to reduce the number of individuals referred to the local hospital Emergency Department (ED) by Hudson and Sudbury police officers. During this quarter of 2022, thirteen (**13**) individuals were diverted from unnecessary hospital admissions due the presence of the JDP clinician on scene. This represents estimated health care cost savings of **\$52,000** (\$4,000 per ED diversion).
